WHAT IS THE 8-MAN BATTING RULE?

We play three outs per inning just like normal baseball, but we use an 8-Man batting rule to keep the game moving along. So if there are less than 3 outs at the end of the inning the players on base will return to their bases the following inning with the same number of outs. But here is where it gets confusing. Let's say the first inning ends and there are only two outs. The runners will return to the bases in the second inning. If the first player in the second inning strikes out that would have been the third out of the previous inning so we have to clear the bases. But that is still only the first out of the second inning. Now let's assume there was one out in the first inning and we have a runner on third base. The batter hits the ball and makes it to first, but the runner on third holds. Now we have runners on first and third. The runner on first has no outs on him, but the runner on third has one out on him. The next batter strikes out. So there is only one out in the second inning, but the runner on third now has two outs on him. The next batter pops it up to left field and the ball is caught. That's the second out of the current inning, but the third out for the runner on third. The runner on third immediately disappears, meaning **they can't make a play on him**. He's already on his way to the dugout. So if they throw it to third for a double play it doesn't count as a double play because that was the third out of the inning for the boy on third. The runner on first now has two outs on him once the ball was caught and can advance to second after he tags up at first. Anyone confused yet?? It takes time, but you'll get it. Go Tar Heels!!!
